OVERVIEW OF PORTRAITS OF EXCELLENCE

The University of the Southern Caribbean (USC) has a culturally diverse population of over 2500 students from over 20 different countries. The institution which was founded in 1927 has produced many local and international scholars. USC continues in its commitment to provide avenues for individuals to attain tertiary education, in an atmosphere that fosters spiritual nurture, intellectual curiosity, moral integrity and cultural diversity.

USC recognizes and accepts its responsibility to seek opportunities to effect transformation in the lives of all who pass through its walls. This responsibility is clearly reflected in the institution's mission – "To transform ordinary people into extraordinary servants of God to humanity through an holistic tertiary experience."

This transformation will only be realized through collaboration between the intellectual, social, physical and spiritual learning process.

Portraits of Excellence - the Annual USC Student Scholarship Awards & Gala, is an event that embodies this collaboration. It combines the intellectual, social, physical and spiritual aspects of learning and thereby provides an avenue for both the participants, and the wider student body to be exposed to transforming life experiences that will prove beneficial to their holistic growth and development.

The event is designed to provide an environment of learning and appreciation of cultural diversity. It also creates a forum for students to express their viewpoints, talents and accomplishments to the public and earn scholarship awards that will assist them in furthering their education. Both male and female participants are allowed to participate.

OBJECTIVES OF PORTRAITS OF EXCELLENCE

- To provide an opportunity for students to portray, using various art forms, the excellence that characterizes the USC Man and Woman.
- To provide an avenue for personal and professional growth for students.
- To provide students with the opportunity to engage in undergraduate research as a high impact practice

during their undergraduate experience.

- To raise the awareness of the diverse cultures represented at USC
- To instill a spirit of community service through a variety of unique nationwide community-based programs.

This year's emphasis of the Scholarship Pageant has been on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals # 1 & 2: **No Poverty** and **Zero Hunger**, under the theme: Fighting Poverty and Hunger: Promoting Food Security in the Caribbean-One Plate at a Time.

REQUIREMENTS FOR PORTRAITS OF EXCELLENCE

DELEGATES:

- Conduct a research project based on the chosen theme for the event;
- Present the research findings at a public forum;
- Present a portrayal of his/her talent/skill, an art form based on the theme for the event;
- Engage in, and report on a community project inspired by the theme for the event. This project must be done in association with their territorial clubs or support groups;
- Present a dress or costume related to both the theme of the program and the culture of the territory that he/ she represents.
- Respond to an impromptu question (on the evening of the gala event)
- Ensure participation of his/her club or group in support for the event.

CRITERIA FOR SHORT LISTING

The screening committee conducts individual interviews with each applicant to ascertain their readiness, appropriateness and willingness to serve as ambassadors for USC. The following criteria guides the selection process:

- Good Citizenship (determined by the Student Development Council)
- A sophomore or junior with a GPA 3.0 or over
- Willingness to be an Ambassador for USC and to espouse the philosophies of the University
- Willingness and ability to participate in all preparatory activities leading up to the final event
- Active involvement in student life on Campus

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

The delegates' presentations are assessed based on the following criteria. The total tally is worth 100%

The Written Research

carries a weight of 30% of the total. Delegates are required to conduct a scholarly research project based on the theme of the event. The project must conform to acceptable standards of research.

The Oral Presentation

is worth 10% of the total. Delegates have the opportunity to present their research findings to their peers in an open forum.

The Talent Segment

is worth 15% of the total and reflects the delegate's creativity.

The Community Development Project

is required to be done along with the support of the delegate's club and is worth 15% of the final mark.

The Costume/Cultural Display

is worth 15% of the final mark. This assesses the delegates' creativity, and the ability to relate his/her presentation to the event theme.

The Impromptu Question

is worth 5% of the final mark and tests the delegates ability to speak intelligently on current issues.

Academic and Personal Development Sessions

is worth 10% of the final mark, and constitutes a series of preparatory workshops, events and training sessions by experts in the various fields.





One recommendation I would make if I were a member of the United Nations General




that the Caribbean works on sustainable agriculture and intra-regional trade to improve measured growth and food security.






